Wisdom knows that our dark times (when God seems angry) change to mornings when we are filled with God's love.... joy to balance our affliction, for the years when we knew misfortune. This weekend, the Catholic Bishops of Ireland have published a Pastoral Letter called "A Hundred Thousand Welcomes?" — to welcome migrants to Ireland. As Christians, we have a responsibility to respond to the key questions of immigration across our island, and the world. This fundamental question asks, "Who is my neighbour?" and to answer this we are informed by the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29-37). In the light of the Gospel and Catholic Social Teaching, our bishops offer this reflection on what hospitality for migrant people means in contemporary Ireland.
